Former Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe has been named the 2009 Pathfinder Award winner by the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce.

The award, bestowed for the second year, is given for innovative leadership that benefits Texas' businesses and workers. The first Pathfinder Award winner was Gov. Rick Perry.

Briscoe, governor for six years starting in 1973, will receive the award at a June 23 luncheon in Ballroom B at the Convention Center.

**Hurricane season
expected to be 'average'**

While different forecasts produce different numbers, the Texas AgriLife Extension service says an "average" hurricane season is likely this year, with about 10 named storms and six hurricanes.

Still, Andy Vestal, the extension service's liaison to the governor's State Operations Center, said Hurricane Ike showed last year that there's nothing average about a hurricane, "especially when it's in your backyard."

The 2008 hurricane season was the third-costliest on record, the extension service said. Ike, which roared through Galveston and surrounding counties, left more than \$20 billion in damages, according to insurance industry estimates.

Which city best builds green? S.A.

That's National Association of Home Builders' verdict.

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Who knew that sprawling San Antonio could be so green?

The National Association of Home Builders on Friday named San Antonio's green building program the best in the nation.

Build San Antonio Green won the "green building program of the year" award at the National Green Building Conference in Dallas.

And the city of San Antonio rolled out its first Green Building Awards program Friday to celebrate commercial and residential projects that have improved energy performance.

Build San Antonio Green, geared toward new-home construction and remodeling, has certified 254 homes.

Executive Director Anita Ledbetter said the program works because builders don't have to hire consultants to walk them through the process. "We're easier for builders to follow and we're cheaper than other green building programs," she said. "More and more builders are coming on board."

Build San Antonio Green is a partnership of the Greater San Antonio Builders Association, the city of San Antonio, Bexar

County, CPS Energy, the San Antonio Water System, VIA Metropolitan Transit, Solar San Antonio, the Greater Bexar County Council of Cities and the Alamo Area Council of Governments.

Those partnerships are key, said Becky Oliver, executive vice president of GSABA. "Everybody worked together to make it happen," Oliver said. "I don't think they have that in any other city like we have."

The program is based on common construction methods — such as stick frame building — and ties into local utility rebate programs.

Frank Sitterle Jr. of Sitterle Homes plans to build 350 garden homes under the program in Campanas at Cibolo Canyons.

He said the program requirements aren't so difficult that the home becomes too expensive for regular homeowners. "They came up with a good medium where people get the benefit of green building and it doesn't cost so much that you price everyone out," Sitterle said.
